Employers who deploy these tools without strong compliance programs now face converging risks from FEHA discrimination liability, CPRA privacy enforcement, emerging common-law theories such as FCRA claims against vendors, and proposed legislation that would further expand private rights of action. The stakes are high, the rules are already in force, and the legal landscape continues to evolve rapidly.
